LEVEL	Higher
ENTRY REQUIREMENTS	Pupils should have achieved a National 5 pass in History or in another Social Subject.
COURSE DESCRIPTION	The purpose of the course is to open up the world of the past for learners. History provides learners with insights into their own lives and of the society and the wider world in which they live. This course has 4 units: Scottish Historical Study – Wallace, Bruce and the Wars of Independence British Historical Study - The Making of Modern Britain, 1851–1951 European and World Historical Study – Russia 1881-1921 Assignment: Students will research a historical issue, analysing the cause of the event and identifying different points of view. They will write up their findings in class under exam conditions.
COURSE ASSESSMENT	Each unit is internally assessed with external verification. The Course will be assessed by an assignment and an external examination. Students must pass all the units, the external exam and the assignment to achieve a course award. External Assessment – Question Paper – 60 marks / Assignment – 30 marks

COURSE ASSESSMENT	This course is comprised of three units which are assessed through the year and an Added Value unit in the form of an Assignment. All 4 areas must be passed to pass the RMPS course at National 4 level. There is no external exam for this course.

COURSE TITLE	RELIGIOUS, MORAL & PHILOSOPHICAL STUDIES
LEVEL	National 5

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS	 Students would normally be expected to have passed: National 4 Religious, Moral and Philosophical Studies Course or relevant units National 4 English or Social Subject
COURSE DESCRIPTION	 The course seeks to: To develop knowledge and understanding of contemporary religious, moral and philosophical issues To look at both religious and non-religious perspectives To explore the questions the different viewpoints, raise and the solutions or approaches they offer To allow learners to reflect on their own experience and views Topics covered are: World Religion - Buddhism Morality and Belief – Crime and Punishment Religious and Philosophical Questions – The origins of Life
COURSE ASSESSMENT	This course is comprised of three units which are assessed throughout the year. The whole course assessment has two parts, an external course exam (75% of the overall grade) and an assignment (25% of the overall grade).
SKILLS FOR LEARNING, SKILLS FOR LIFE and SKILLS FOR WORK INCLUDED	Throughout the course pupils will develop a variety of higher order thinking skills, such as enquiry skills, analysing and evaluation, researching and problem solving.

COURSE TITLE	RELIGIOUS, MORAL & PHILOSOPHICAL STUDIES
LEVEL	Higher

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS	Students would normally be expected to have attained a National 5 in this subject or equivalent in a social subject.
COURSE DESCRIPTION	 The course seeks to: Develop in pupils an in-depth knowledge of the key beliefs of Buddhism, and an understanding of the relevance of these beliefs in today's society; Develop in pupils an understanding of a variety of ethical theories, and the higher order thinking skills required to apply these to contemporary issues; Develop pupils' understanding of the relationship between religious and scientific theories of the origins of the universe and mankind. The course comprises 3 units totalling 120 hours of study, with an additional 40 hours to support teaching and learning across the units. This extra time will also be used for induction into the course, consolidation and support of learning and preparation for course assessment. Unit 1 – World Religion: Buddhism (40 hours) Unit 3 – Religious and Philosophical Questions (RPQ): Origins of Life (40 hours)
COURSE ASSESSMENT	The course is externally assessed in 2 parts: Component 1 – Questions Paper (60 marks) Pupils will be answer questions on each of the 3 units studied. Component 2 – Assignment (30 marks) The purpose of this assignment is to demonstrate challenge and application by demonstrating skills, knowledge and understanding within the context of a religious, moral or philosophical topic or issue. Each of the units will also be internally assessed. These units must be passed in order to sit the final SQA exam.
