Shaving Foam

Scooping, squishing, smearing, making tracks with trucks and diggers, drawing shapes and making ice creams and milkshakes, building foamy towers and then knocking them down.....foam play is always huge hit!

What you need

Shaving foam

A table, tray or a bin bag on the floor

Why play with shaving foam?

For older toddlers shaving foam is a great tool for early mark making and trying out letters and shapes - children who haven't yet mastered the pencil grip can really enjoy drawing and shape making with instant results and without frustration.

Playing in shaving foam is a great sensory experience- The smell of the foam, the feeling of it on your skin, what happens if you clap your hands? And the activity is quick and easy to clean up after.





Play Dough

Ingredients

- 3 cups flour
- 1 cup of Salt
- 1 cup of warm water
- Splash of oil

Method

- Add all of your ingredients into a large mixing bowl
- If you have paint or food colouring you can add this to your mixture
- Is your mixture too wet? Add flour
- Is your mixture too dry? Add water

What can you make?

- Can you make a snake/worm?
- Can you make a ball?
- Can you make a snowman?
- Can you make your dough flat?
- Can you stretch, can you squash, and can you poke the dough?

Why do we play with playdough?

- Playing with dough helps to develop, what we call, fine motor development in children. Squashing, stretching, pulling and mushing dough is strengthening children's hands preparing them for writing.
- Play dough also helps develop children's hand-eye co-ordination-This prepares children for reading, writing, is important for balancing and playing sports.
